

COMMENTS FROM MIKE GILBERT --

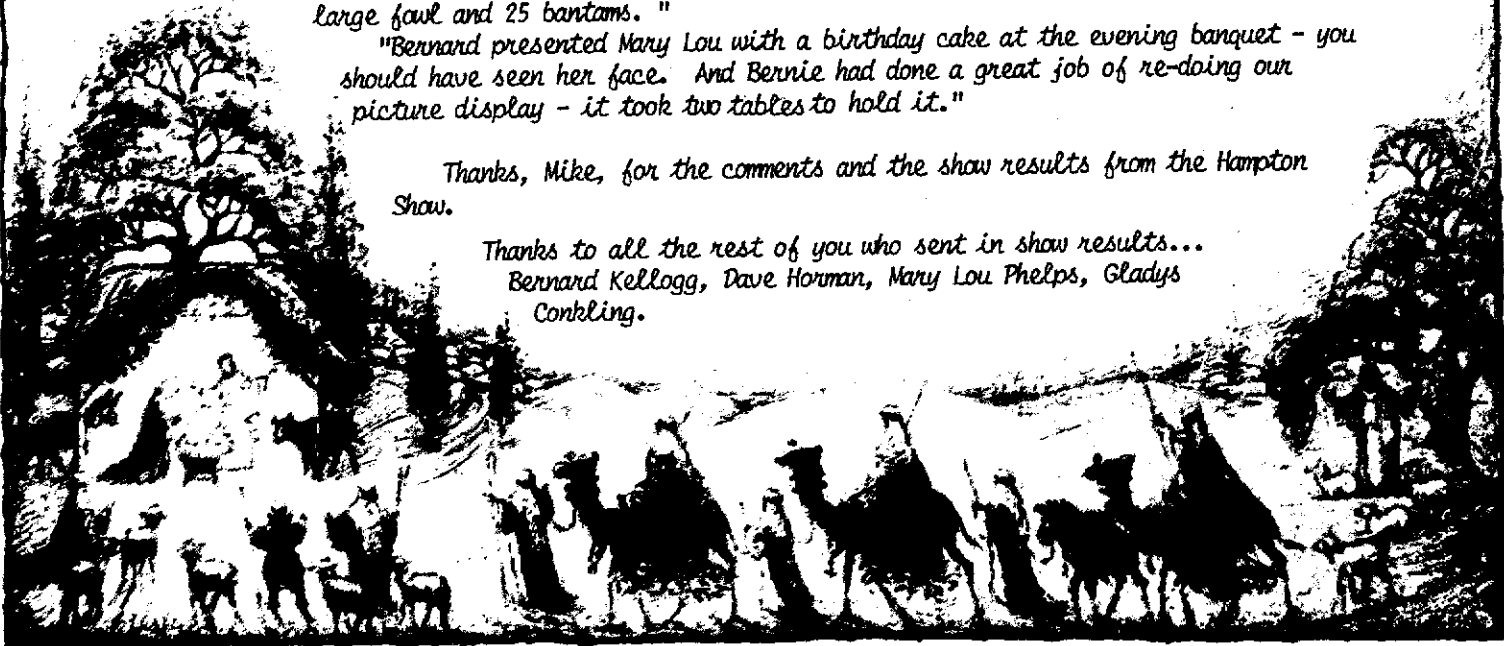
