

Ameraucana vs EE

That special moment is approaching. You've checked the incubator three times in the last 30 minutes, hoping to hear that first peep. It took months of looking at pictures, asking your friends, scanning the internet, and researching breed traits to decide to start a small flock of Ameraucanas and now, finally, the first

chicks are due to hatch. In the fourth trip to the incubator, you see a small pip in one of the shells and your heart leaps.

Thirty minutes later, you're looking at this chick with dark marks around the eyes, and a stripe on its head and that same heart falls through your chest now. From all the pictures you've seen, you know this is not what a wheaten Ameraucana chick is supposed to look like.

Or, your cute little chicks grow up and start laying eggs of their own. Having too many chickens, you offer to sell some of your "real" Ameraucanas. Someone takes a look at your pictures and, without much preface or warning, tells you, "Those are EEs, not Ameraucanas."

Many of us have been through some variation of one, or both, of the above scenarios. It's frustrating, heartbreaking, and discouraging, to say nothing of financially draining. So, how do you avoid it? What is the difference between Easter Egger, Americana, and Ameraucana?

To put it in it's simplest terms: only one of those three are a true breed. The other three are combinations of various breeds; also known as mixed breeds. The definition of a pure breed is an animal who's parents are both of the same breed. With Americanas (emphasis on spelling), Easter Eggers (EE), and Olive Eggers (OE) they are almost always the result of a chicken of one breed (one of the blue egg laying breeds, such as Ameraucanas) and anyhing else; eg. Rhode Island Red, Marans, Barred Rock or just the "good neighborhood" chicken running around the farm yard.

Ameraucanas (Bantams and Large Fowl) are American Poultry Association and American Bantam Association approved breeds, which means they have a Standard of Perfection that dictates how an Ameraucana should look and what varieties are accepted. Anything that falls outside of that Standard or doesn't fit in any of the 8 accepted color varieties (Ameraucanas are currently accepted in black, blue, blue wheaten, brown red, buff, silver, wheaten, and white) is an Easter Egger (EE).

Pure bred animals, of whatever species, should breed true to type. That means a black Ameraucana bred to a black Ameraucana should produce black Ameraucanas, not brown, red, silver, or black with copper etching around the hackles. They should have the muffs and beards that are an important trait for the breed. Because an EE will have a mixed bag of genetics, they cannot breed true. That beautiful EE of which you are so proud may never produce anything that looks even remotely like itself. That's the problem with mixed breeds – you just don't know what's behind them.

So, what do you look for to make sure you're getting the Real Thing?

First, become familiar with the basics of the Standard for a true Ameraucana. You can read the highlights on our website, Ameraucana.org.

Second, learn the 8 varieties of a true Ameraucana, so when someone tries to sell you a wheaten Ameraucana, you'll know what a wheaten Ameraucana looks like.

As with many other breeds, there are those breeders who are working to expand the Ameraucana breed beyond the accepted 8 color varieties. These usually are Ameraucana bred to

Ameraucana, but the variety of the parents may be different. These are called "project" colors and include, but are not limited to: lavender, chocolate, splash, and splash wheaten. A responsible breeder will tell you that the chicken you are buying is a "project" hird.

Third, here are a few basic tips that will help you quickly identify

birds that may not be true Ameraucanas:

- Leg color: Ameraucanas should have slate (or black on black, blue, and brown red Ameraucanas) legs. Legs that look a little greenish means that the underlying skin color is yellow, not white. Ameraucanas have white skin. Check the bottom of their feet and you should see white.
- 2. Pea Comb: Ameraucanas should have a pea comb, not a single, rose, or any other type of comb. Even chicks will have the telltale little row of bumps that indicate a pea comb
- 3. Muffs and Beards: A signature trait of the true Ameraucana, a full muff and beard is a requirement. If the muff and beard is absent, or significantly scraggly – it might be an EE. Note, though, that birds in breeding pens can have their beards and muffs picked on by other birds, so this is not the most reliable method of distinguishing Ameraucana vs EE.
- 4. Tail set: This might be a little tricker if you're not familiar with tailsets and used to looking at them. Ameraucana should never have a tailset (applies more to cocks than to hens) that shoots straight up off the back at a 90 degree angle.
- 5. Egg color: While Ameraucanas should lay blue eggs, there is a wide range of blues that would be acceptable even into the bluish-green colors; and, later in the year the color may not be as intense as when they first start laying for the year. But an Ameraucana should not lay a brown egg that would be a sure sign that there is something else mixed into the genetic pool.

These are the basics and you'll learn more as you search for your Ameraucanas. I hope this will help you avoid some of the pain that many of us have gone through. The best piece of advice I can leave with you is: When looking for quality Ameraucanas, go to the source! Always check for Ameraucana Breeders in the Breeder's directory on the website. You never know — one might be just around the corner from you!

Western District Director Jean Ribbeck

We have been having unseasonably warm weather here in the Pacific Northwest for the past couple weeks. I don't know whether to hatch some eggs or wait for the other shoe to drop. I have had no requests for meets in the Western District. So there will be no meets placed for the spring show season, except for the one I placed before the last bulletin. Remember all meet requests must be made in time for notice to be placed in the preceding quarterly bulletin. There have been several farms in the Pacific Northwest that have tested positive for avian influenza and have been depopulated. I want to remind everyone that the comingling of wild waterfowl with your flock is hazardous. Right now the waterfowl migration is underway and wild ducks have been the vector of infection. Keep a watchful eye on your flock and practice regular biosecurity and you should be fine.

From the desk of...

North Central Director Duane Schroeder

Until recently I had been raising both LF Wheaten Ameraucanas and Black Orpingtons. I decided to abandon the Orpingtons in favor of Black Ameraucanas. Cliff Redden was kind enough to sell me a very nice young trio of LF blacks at the Lucasville National show. I was patiently waiting for the pullets to start producing eggs so that I could hatch some in 2015, only to lose one of them to a hawk. This was my first loss to a hawk attack. I had let them out to free range and returned only a couple of hours later to find what looked like the result of a large firecracker exploding inside the better of the two pullets (of course).

I decided I'd better work to perpetuate the line asap, so I set 12 eggs from the remaining pullet in January. All 12 were fertile, but only 6 hatched. I continue to have issues with chicks pipping and not hatching and/or fully developed chicks never pipping at all. In what I've read, and in talking to others, I believe the problem is humidity related. If my hygrometer is correct, I have been incubating at about 60% until lockdown, and then increasing to 65% for the last 3 days. My theory now is that the humidity initially is so high as to prevent the air cell to be of sufficient size to allow proper movement/positioning of the chick. I'll lower the starting humidity the next time, and hope for a better success rate.

South Central Director Paul Smith

Greetings from the South-Central District.

Hatching season is well under way for some, but just starting for us. Over 20 years of hatching chicks and still learning as new things come each year. Our first GQF cabinet incubators for 2015 are due to hatch Feb. 17. One is filled to capacity and the other one is two-thirds full. Hopefully we will get some chicks to send out and a few to keep for the early shows. We have tried four styrofoam incubators at two week intervals without a chick as of now. The first one had a fertility issue which is normal with the early eggs from breeders that are not receiving extra light. We put lights on most of the 49 breeding pens two days before Christmas. The past six years we didn't put lights on any of the breeders which caused both a delay in egg



duction which is much earlier than it would have been without the lights. Fertility increased with each of the styrofoam incubators as more of the eggs contained chick embryos which died at about 7 to 10 days of development. We were running the small incubators dry without the use of water. That works fine later in the spring when we are receiving normal rains and not running the fire place. My diagnosis consist of increasing the humidity by adding the water to correct the problem. We will know in a few weeks as another Styrofoam incubator is running with water in it along with a GQF cabinet incubator for our March 3 hatch. There is still plenty of time to get chicks hatched for our national meet since it is November 7 & 8, 2015 at Fayetteville, Ark., a month later than most of our nationals. Speaking of our 2015 national meet we have found an engraver who is willing to make the plates for plaques like we did for the 2005 national in Sedalia, Missouri! We are going to build them again out of black walnut lumber cut from a tree off our place. Having seen the trial run of the Ameraucana logo on a plate, the plaques will be something everyone will want to win! We plan on having BV and RV for each class plus the special awards and Jr. awards.

Get some chicks hatched or purchased and make plans to attend our 2015 national Ameraucana meet! We have blocked 20 rooms for the ABC at a \$20 discount at the Comfort Inn. They are \$79. They may be booked by calling (479-571-5177) by Oct. 2.

Hope to see you at the Fayetteville, Ark. National meet!
