The 1989 National held Nov 3-5 at Highland, Illinois will be remembered as the greatest gathering of Ameraucana exhibitors and of Ameraucana bantams,

prior to the 1990's, in the history of the breed.

If memory serves, some 12 exhibitors and 17 members (counting two fatherson combinations) descended on the Ill-No Bantam Club Show to take part in what has become our semi-annual National Meet. One hundred or more bantams were on display - a grand sight to one who can remember "national" meets with only two exhibitors - and not so very many years ago. You can ask Jerry Segler about that!

Most encouraging to this writer was the participation of three junior exhibitors, all of whom left with renewed enthusiasm and new varieties to work with. Matt Betz, Dave Bandomir and Robbie Gilbert will be forces to be reckoned with in Ameraucana meets of the near future. I know they will keep us older members on our toes if we wish to remain competitive.

I especially enjoyed visiting with our newer members and rekindling friendships with longtime acquaintances. The beautiful plaque I received at our club meeting was something unexpected and undeserved, but thanks to

those reponsible - they know who they are.

Another major highlight at Ill-Mo was the artwork of Rusty Hart. I believe we can look to Rusty to improve the Ameraucana pictures in both the ABA and APA standards and that the club should commission him to do so as soon as possible.

In the meantime, I am to revise the written descriptions in both standards to eliminate differences and clarify certain points. open as soon as you are old enough. All it takes is a great gift a smile and lots of PR.





#### REFLECTIONS FROM THE BIG SKY COUNTRY -

Well, it's all over - even the shouting - the National Meet. But what memories!! We (The Ameraucana Breeders Club) had twelve exhibitors from seven states exhibiting over 100 Ameraucanas. Is that a record? You bet!

Now trying to put on paper all the excitement of Nov 3-5. Impossible..You just had to be there. The showroom was great..well lighted, well ventilated, comfortable. The ILL-MO Bantam club did a great job. We thank them for their contributions in making this a great show for us.

While they were in the office I called my people in MT to let them know I was okay and found out my younger sister had been taken to the hospital with a blood clot to her heart. Jeanne and I started setting up the club table and all of a sudden there was Bernard Kellogg from WI with his traveling companions, Rande Buske & David Bandomir. Bernard had the club bulletin board...revised since 1987. It is now six panels with each panel 28"x36" made into three sections. We put the club book on top of the Champion cages so all could see them. Generally speaking, the Club table was very impressive with the trophies, the fantastic drawings by Rusty, the tee shirts and so forth.

Jim Allan's Ameraucanas were already in their cages when I got there. I met Mr. Allan later. Very fine man. Thank you, Jim. I'm sure I will enjoy the birds you so generously

gave me.
